Former Mayor Karen Alexander used to say that Pops at the Post was one of her favorite days of the year for Salisbury.

It was a day she spent months preparing for as a cheerleader, fundraiser and active board member. Truly, if there were one event that brought together all of the things our former mayor loved best, it was this public concert.

Even when she was promoting the building of Bell Tower Green nearly a decade ago, she had a vision she shared frequently of Pops being held like it will be held this year — in the middle of the grass from a beautiful stage with gorgeous views of our surrounding community.

After her cancer diagnosis last fall, Mayor Alexander stayed active in planning for this year's Pops, helping with creative feedback on how

the stage could be designed to hold all of the musicians in Bell Tower Green for the first time

She was thrilled to learn that Daniel Wiley would be leading the symphony, and was excited about this year's first concert for him in Bell Tower Green. She so wanted to be here with us this year.

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A missing piece: Pops at Post returns without late Robbins

2025 is a year of many firsts for Pops at the Post.

It will be the first Pops conducted by our new conductor, Daniel Wiley. It will be the first concert provided entirely in Bell Tower Green. It will be the first concert with expanded tailgating.

But 2025 will also be the first Pops at the Post in the past six years without Melissa Robbins quietly pulling strings behind the scenes to make this concert possible.

Unless you are on the board of Pops at the Post, you probably have no idea how many human hours go into making this concert happen. Melissa was the backbone behind the organization Pops at the Post (which is a separate 501(c) (3) nonprofit from the symphony), serving as its treasurer for all these years and paying every bill and overseeing all financial accounting.

And aside from the legal and organizational roles that she assumed in her service to Pops, Melissa was often the first to show up and the last to leave on the day of the ready to leave with their event. This was not a job

Way, but a passion project that she did for you - a fellow citizen of Rowin this community and wanted to make it the best it could be. Her contributions to this event went above and beyond in every imaginable way.

Furthermore, Melissa enlisted the help of her family each and every year. Her husband Gregg was often the first to be seen setting up chairs in the morning (along with their children). They also were the last to leave late in the evening after the music stopped and all of the contractors were satisfactorily loaded up and checks, which Melissa requirement in her work was holding in her orga-

Melissa died unexpectedly on Jan. 21 of this year, leaving a huge hole in the organization, and, more importantly, in the hearts of all those who had the privilege to work with her. Pops at the Post (as an event and as an organization) are as special as they are because of all that Melissa poured into them. This community will never be able to adequately thank Melissa's family for all that they too have poured into this event, but we hope that you feel great pride knowing that this community knows that this year's performance still has Melissa's fingerprints, whispers and influence all over it.

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New Pops conductor eyes first show

While Pops at the Post has been around for two decades, Saturday's show will be a first for new conductor Daniel Wiley.

Wiley was tapped to be the new music director for the Salisbury Symphony last year and will replace long-standing Pops at the Post maestro David Hagy this time around.

He called the opportunity more than just a privilege.

"I am super honored to be joining this tradition that we have," he said. "It is not just any other concert. There is a lot of history behind this show along with a huge

More than anything, what is most exciting is how it brings so many people together."

With a slight change of scenery, Pops at the Post will look a little different this year but Wiley is embracing the possibilities.

"This year, the Pops at the Post board made the decision to go over to the bandshell in the park that was built for the orchestras to play in," Wiley said. "It will be sort of a new lease in a new area. with the migration over there. We are excited about being able to utilize another part of the space of that park while keeping in line with the tradition to where things came from with the connection

paying homage to that."

As he has prepared, those considerations have left him asking the question: What kind of experience can we provide for the community and how can we bring people together?

The title of the program is "Tragedies and Triumphs."

As such, Wiley said the music will run the gamut of emotions from celebrations and victories to setbacks. Various pieces will transport the audience along that roller coaster throughout the evening.

"We will explore the two extremes of the human existence," Wiley said. "Everyone has experienced triumph and community connection. to the (Salisbury) Post and everyone has experienced

tragedies, so it will resonate. I have done this a few times. It is a really fun way to spend an evening."

Wiley is known around the country for his role as a composer and musical director. Although he has not led Pops at the Post, Wiley said he has shared his impressions of it with others across America.

"I like to talk about this like a block party," Wiley said. "It's a Pops concert at the Post but there are all sorts of things to do. There are food trucks, a swing band that plays. I want to welcome as many people as possible to come and enjoy that orchestra, the bands and Salisbury for what it is. Come enjoy the community."



Frequently asked questions

Where is the concert this year?

This year, the Pops at the Post concert will be held in the Bell Tower Green Park on the stage. The orchestra being led by Daniel Wiley will perform for the first time for our Pops audience on the stage located at 120 S. Church Street in Downtown Salisbury.

What time does the performance start?

The Salisbury Swing Band will perform on the Salisbury Post loading dock from 5-7 p.m. The Pops at the Post orchestra will begin sometime around 7:30 after soundcheck.

How can I follow along?

You can get a handheld fan with the program on the back at the Salisbury Symphony tent located near West Innes Street.

How long does the concert last?

Pops at the Post is typically a two-hour concert, with a 20-minute intermission. There are two planned encores, but families with young children may feel free to leave at any time. Please enjoy the concert, but please respect those guests who many be more focused on the music.



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Is there handicapped parking available?

Yes. There is limited handicapped parking in the Salisbury Post Building's courtyard located on the East side of the building. Placards are required.

Are their restrooms available?

restrooms in the park. There will also be portable toilets available both for handicapped persons and not.

Is alcohol allowed?

Pops at the Post will be hosting vendors who will be serving beer and wine. Beer and wine must be consumed in the boundaries of the park. No outside alcohol is allowed.

May I bring my dog on a leash?

The only pets allowed are service animals.

Will there be street closures during the event?

The three (Church. Yes. There are public Fisher and Jackson) streets immediately surrounding Bell Tower Green Park will be closed on the day of the event. West Innes Street will remain open.

Will there be public parking?

Parking is available throughout downtown Salisbury. The lot behind the former Wells Fargo

Building will be reserved for musicians. If you need help in located a parking space, visit the Downtown Salisbury website.

Can I tailgate?

Yes. Tailgating spots will be available along South Church Street and West Fisher Street and will open at 1 p.m. Tailgaters are allowed only one 10-foot by 10-foot tent and are allowed to bring coolers. Tables food and lawn games. Tailgaters must be in position no later than 6 p.m. To purchase your tailgating spot, go to Pops at the Post tailgating 2025 listed on Eventbrite.

May I bring something to cook on if I am tailgating?

Yes, but no open flames are allowed for safety reasons.

What if someone has an emergency of some kind?

Uniformed police as well as Salisbury firefighters are on hand and will be available to assist you.

Where can I donate to the concert?

You may donate at the Salisbury symphony tent. Salisbury Civitans will collect donations during intermission by passing the hats. Donate online at www. givelylively.org/donate/pops-at-the-post-inc/pops-at-the-post-2025.

Is there free Cheerwine again this year?

Yes. Cheerwine and Diet Cheerwine will be available at a trailer on the north side of the park near W. Innes Street.

Is there food available?

Yes. Vendors will be set up along West Fisher and South Jackson streets. This year's lineup is diverse and all vendors are excited to serve you.

What is the seating situation?

People are encouraged to bring their own chairs and blankets. VIP seating for sponsors and special guests will be set up directly in front of the stage and appropriately marked around 3:30 p.m.






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
